4,950 infants and children through childcare sun safety policies

4,020 outdoor workers through outdoor worksite sun safety policies

765,720 visitors and patrons through outdoor recreation sun safety policies

1,120 employees through paid time off for cancer screening policies

85%

of adults in NY support increasing the indoor tanning age to 21

ADOPTING POLICIES

Our partners are adopting lasting policies to support cancer prevention amongst their staff, youth, and visitors.

PRACTICING PREVENTION

SUN SAFETY

- Encouraging the use of hats, sunscreen, and protective clothing when outside
- Installing sunscreen dispensers making free sunscreen available
- Adding shade protection to provide sun-safe outdoor spaces

SCREENINGS

• Promoting cancer screenings through worksite wellness

AWARENESS

- Installing signs with reminders of the importance of cancer prevention
- Raising awareness that the HPV vaccine is safe and effective cancer prevention
- Providing cancer prevention education to staff, youth, and visitors
