We are excited to announce the new sun safety and paid time off for cancer screening policies going into effect January 1, 2023 at Hulbert Engineering and Land Surveying!

Building an environment for employees to protect themselves by preventing skin cancer as well as time off for a cancer screening exam each



year demonstrates a commitment to a healthy workforce. Being up to date with recommended screenings for cancers, including breast, cervical, and colorectal can improve health outcomes and save lives. Providing a paid time off for cancer screening benefit encourages employees to prioritize their health and find cancers before they start, or early, when treatment is most successful. In addition to improving employee health, preventative cancer screenings reduce health care costs and reduce related business expenditures. President, Gene Hulbert Jr. shared, "It is important that all our employees are provided with education and sun protection measures to provide a safe environment to work in. That includes a paid time off benefit for annual cancer screenings as well as protective clothing and gear from the sun's harmful rays. Health Initiative

Educating Youth About the HPV Vaccine

CPiA works hard to educate about the potential negative effects of the human papillomavirus (HPV) and to advocate for the HPV vaccine as safe and effective cancer prevention. One of our strategies is educational outreach to various population groups, including students, parents, and medical professionals. Recently, CPiA at the Health Initiative was able to reach a unique audience. In the months of December and January, we gave six HPV presentations to medical career students at BOCES in St. Lawrence and Jefferson Counties. This was a perfect opportunity for this unique group, ages 16-18. Not only is this information vital to them as young adults starting to make autonomous health decisions, but also as future medical professionals.

For evaluation purposes, we distribute an anonymous survey before the presentation. There are four statements about HPV and the vaccine and students are asked to express their beliefs on a scale from "strongly agree" to "strongly disagree". This gives us an accurate baseline of students' knowledge of the topic prior to our outreach. At the end of the presentation, students are asked to complete the survey





again. The data from these surveys not only guides our work, but also affirms that this work is necessary. Of the 70 students who were in attendance between the six presentations, 49 of them (70%) agreed that the HPV vaccine helps prevent some types of HPV and cancers caused by those types of HPV (only 6 students, or 8%, "strongly agreed"). According to the post surveys, the number of students who agreed with that statement rose to 63, with a majority of them (55%) strongly agreeing this time.

We were pleasantly surprised at how engaged many of the students were. Several asked questions during and after the presentation, which indicates we were connecting with them. Education and advocacy is the best way to increase vaccination rates. With our continued work in this field, people will learn that they have the power to take action against cancer!

Working Together, Reducing Cancer, Saving Lives

New York State Cancer Consortium (nyscancerconsortium.org) is a voluntary network of individuals and organizations throughout New York State (NYS) that collaborate to address the cancer burden. The Consortium and its members are guided by the NYS Comprehensive Cancer Control Plan and work to leverage partnerships to implement and plan priority interventions within their communities.

Stony Brook Cancer Center

Stony Brook University (SBU) School of Dental Medicine Taking Action Against HPV Cancers

SBU School of Dental Medicine is taking action against HPV cancers with the help of Stony Brook Cancer Center's CPiA team! This semester, we were invited as guest lecturers to educate SBU dental residents about HPV cancers and HPV vaccination. HPV causes six types of cancer, including oropharyngeal cancers, or cancers of the mouth and throat. The HPV vaccine can prevent oropharyngeal cancers and the five other cancers caused by HPV, and dental providers can support vaccination by:

- Including immunization history on intake forms and discussing the HPV vaccine when reviewing medical history or during oral exams.
- Recommending HPV vaccination to patients in the recommended age range and referring to primary care provider if not vaccinated. Help refer patients to primary care provider if care is not established.
- Displaying rack cards and posters throughout practice promoting the HPV vaccine, and making materials available for patients or parents who would like more information.

Dental residents learned these strategies to increase HPV vaccination in our interactive session, as well as how to address vaccine hesitancy with patients and parents, current trends in HPV cancer burden, and vaccine assistance resources for under and uninsured patients. Residents found

the session informative and felt "empowered" to know they can have an impact on cancer prevention as dental providers. The course professor, Dr. Rekha Reddy, DMD, plans to add this topic to the course syllabus going forward and has already invited our CPiA

team to present again for the spring semester. We thank Dr. Reddy and the SBU School of Dental Medicine for empowering our future dental providers to take action against HPV cancers!
